At Oktoberfest, we sent over 30 volunteers to help!

In October, Coach Bill Rimmer was named Delaware Youth Soccer Competitive Boys Coach of the Year, and was then voted the USYSA Region 1 Soccer Coach of the year. He will be honored at the NSCAA Convention in Indianapolis on Jan 16th. Coach Bill has been with DSB since 2006, and is an associate member of club along with Mary his wife and team manager.

On Nov 11th, DSB won the MAPS(Midatlantic Premier Soccer) tournament Championship for U16 boys. The tournament is ranked #1 in the United States by Got Soccer.com. As a result, DSB has a team now ranked #10 in the USA for U16 boys (out of 2,500 teams in 50 States). Our scores were as follows:

There is a cleanup day on Saturday November 24th 9:30 AM on the DSB grounds. The next property committee meeting will take place Monday December 3rd at 7:30 pm in the library.

We thought our members would be interested in knowing what a typical Property Committee meeting entails:

1. Completed items for the month of October
 - a. Purchased entrance hall carpet with DSB insignia
 - b. Replaced compressor on hall bar cooler
 - c. Unclogged stopped up toilets and replaced flush valves in Ladies Rest Room
 - d. Semiannual preventive maintenance and inspection of all mechanical equipment
 - e. Repair of cabinet doors and drawers in DSB kitchen
 - f. Completed trim around doors and baseboard in main entrance hallway
 - g. Light bulbs changed and new light installed outside Bauernstube
 - h. Striping in parking lot redone – we were not happy with quality of original striping
 - i. Stored picnic tables in pavilion in preparation of Winter
 - j. Property clean-up, grass cutting, general grounds maintenance and garage cleanout
 - k. Winterized building to keep waterlines from freezing
 - l. Many other small maintenance projects throughout the facility
2. Working on the following:
 - a. Install weather stripping around all outside doors
 - b. Trim or remove dead branches from trees in the front yard
 - c. Install timers for parking lot lights
 - d. Paint coat room and touchup walls
 - e. Repaint inside of entrance hall doors
 - f. Replace door closers on entrance hallway doors
 - g. Repair alarm on fire door in game room
 - h. Assemble newly purchased fussball table for game room
3. Future considerations:
 - a. Check on feasibility and payback on installing solar panels to produce electricity
 - b. Investigating cost and feasibility to install free standing walk-in cooler/freezer
 - c. Provide gravel road to access toilets and tents during Oktoberfest
 - d. Solve problem of overloading electric supply in pavilion due to distributors using more and more power for lights, coolers etc.

As you can see there is a lot going on – unnoticed and taken for granted to keep our facilities in good repair and our membership safe.

We are always looking for people who are willing to help in any way. If you are willing to put in some time, even if you are unskilled – we have work you can do! If you have skills that would keep some of the required repairs in house, it is a tremendous benefit to all.

ENZIAN VOLKSTANZGRUPPE SERVING THE COMMUNITY

The Enzian Volkstanzgruppe of the Delaware Saengerbund would like to share a tradition which was started 30 years ago, and became one of the highlights of our performances year after year.



For a community outreach project we decided to volunteer once a year to provide an Oktoberfest dinner for the Ministry of Caring in Wilmington, Delaware, a non-profit organization run by the Capuchin Franciscan



Friars. Our volunteerism and donation is to help raise funds for the homeless shelters, daily dining room, emergency shelters, transitional and long-term residences, a residence for people with AIDS, a shelter for battered women, child care centers and medical and dental centers for the poor and homeless that the Franciscan Brothers operate every day of the year.

We purchase and prepare all the food, and serve a meal for the Ministry of Caring in the guise of an International Night, which is a fund raiser for this very important organization. The cost to the Enzian Volkstanzgruppe is approximately \$500, and the giving of our time. The attendees pay \$25 per person, all monies donated to the Ministry of Caring. The money collected - \$5,000 - is all profit for the Ministry. They are able to multiply this money by purchasing food for the homeless from government suppliers for pennies on the dollar. This increases their purchasing power of the \$5,000 profit to double the actual amount or more. At an approximate cost of \$2 to \$3 per meal, this money will provide 3,000 to 5,000 meals to people much less fortunate than we are.

Before and during the dinner our guests are entertained by either our Enzian Musikanten (our House Kapelle) or by our faithful accordion player, Steve Armstrong. After the meal, the Enzian Volkstanzgruppe performs for the guests to help give this venue a real Oktoberfest atmosphere.

We wanted to share this experience with all of you as we are proud of this tradition and believe it is in line with our German heritage. It is our hope that it will give some of you inspiration to do a similar project in your community.

SAVE THE DATE! **JUNE 1, 2013 WILL BE THE** **MID-ATLANTIC KINDERFEST**

The Mid-Atlantic Kinderfest started with the goal of giving the youth of our area Vereine in the Mid-Atlantic region an opportunity to get to know one another, and to share dances and music with one another. In 1993, the Auerhahn Schuhplattler Verein of Oley, PA, had many young members, mostly between the ages of 6 and 10. At that time they participated in the first Kinder Gauplattler at a Gaufest. However, children were only starting to attend the Gaufest and there was not very much mixing of the children of the different Vereine.



To encourage youth involvement, the Auerhahn Schuhplattler Verein decided to host a festival with the children in mind. The day included a parade of the children, entertainment from live music, carnival style games and a magician. All activities stopped when it was time for the Kindergruppe to dance. This encouraged the children to watch the others dance, and they also were not missing any other activities while they were dancing.

The first year, 1994, approximately 60 children attended the Kinderfest. They represented 7 Vereine: GTV Edelweiss, Enzian Volkstanzgruppe, Germania Almrausch SV, United German Hungarians, GTV Almrausch, Auerhahn Schuhplattler Verein and Alpenrose Schuhplattlers. In 1995, even more children and Vereine participated; close to 120 children attended. It was very exciting to see a school bus full of participants from Delaware!

In 1996, GTV Almrausch from Philadelphia volunteered to host the Kinderfest. This was the start of this festival becoming the Mid-Atlantic Kinderfest. During this event, leaders of the Kindergruppe, with the help of the 1996 Gaujugendvertreter, Tommy Keith from EVTG Delaware, established guidelines for a traveling Mid-Atlantic Kinderfest. Three main points were decided for future Kinderfest: 1. The festival must be fun for the children. 2. Minimal travel time for the majority of the

Vereine. 3. The festival should be as inexpensive as possible for the attendees. At that time, the 3 main regions were established: Southern Region – Philadelphia and Delaware; Central Region - mid-Pennsylvania; and Northern Region - New Jersey and New York City area. The fest would rotate from year to year, region to region. A time for the fest was also established to be the weekend containing the first Saturday of June. The day of the fest, Saturday or Sunday, would be decided by the hosting Verein.

In 1997, the Mid-Atlantic Kinderfest traveled to GTEV Schlierachtaler Stamm. Thanks to sign maker Kenny Kasper and painter Elisabeth Elenis, this was the first year for official signs for each Verein to carry in the parade. From there the fest continued to travel among the three established regions.

The Mid-Atlantic Kinderfest quickly grew to include over 15 different participating Vereine and close to 200 children from 5 different states. Each host Verein has added its own style of games and entertainment for the children. All have been a great success!

In 2010, the 17th Mid-Atlantic Kinderfest was hosted by Germania Almrausch SV in Poughkeepsie, NY. For the first time this traveling festival was joined by SG Alpenland Montreal. It was also at that Kinderfest the traveling commemorative scrapbooks were born. The host Verein purchased two books and many of the participating Verein brought completed pages filled with cropped photographs bringing back great memories of the past 19 years. It is hoped the past years will fill in and the memories be captured in the scrapbooks for years to come and shared by all.
