GERMANIC GENEALOGY GROUP (GGG)

All members of the DSB are always invited and welcome to attend.

1. On Monday, April 29th at 7:30 pm, our program will be about the **Hessian Soldiers in Delaware**. **Bill Conley**, board member of the Pencader Heritage Area Association and retired history teacher will introduce **Wade Catts** as the principle speaker.

Mr Catts, a Professional Historical Archeologist, is writing a book on the Battle of Cooch's Bridge, where Hessian soldiers played a prominent role. The soldiers left behind diaries that he has studied. He also has traced where they came from and where they went. All are welcome to attend this very informative lecture.

2. Lloyd Maier postponed the meeting that was to be held on Monday March 25th due to the snow that fell all day. The roads were probably ok that evening, but she wanted to ensure that all were safe and that Max Dooley would have a full audience when he makes his presentation. Did you know that the origin of the famous Mason-Dixon Line is located in White Clay Creek State Park? Long before the land was dedicated to public recreation it was a focal point in resolving the long-running colonial boundary dispute between the Penn and Calvert Families.

Dr. Mackenzie will summarize the historical background of the boundary dispute; how Mason and Dixon conducted the survey; why Delaware got such weird boundaries; and the symbolic importance of the Mason-Dixon Line in the 19th and 20th centuries.

Dr. John Mackenzie teaches courses in resource economics and GIS and conducts research in water resources, land use, political economy and public education. He earned a B.A. in English from Harvard University, a B.A. and M.A. in economics from Cambridge University, and a Ph.D. in resource economics from the University of Rhode Island. He is also a recreational runner who has logged about 10,000 trail miles in WCCSP. He and several friends founded the Trail Dawgs "Athletic" Club in 1996; the group now had over 200 members. He is the race director for the Triple Crown trail races which are staged from the Carpenter Rec. Area every April.

Delaware Saengerbund History: the Culture Committee

Since culture is expressed in every aspect of all groups of the DSB, the Culture Committee was established in 1978 as a standing committee by Alfred Escheu. William Sigmund was named first chair. The Culture Committee undertakes programs that support the objectives of the club's constitution: to encourage, support and perpetuate the study of the German language, culture, traditions, customs, dancing and German choral singing; to share traditional sociability among the German community and extend it to the community at large; and to foster a better understanding of the contributions made by the German immigrant to the American way of life.

The committee serves under the 2nd Vice President and occasionally collaborates on programs of the Entertainment committee; however, it offers seasonal and special programs of its own. Language classes, the library, the Deutsche Schule and the genealogy group are major aspects of this committee. The club awards monetary prizes for excellence in German language study to students at the University of Delaware and local high schools. It also underwrites two children/grandchildren of members to attend two weeks at Waldsee, the summer German language immersion camp in Minnesota. Every 3 years local high school teachers and students of German are invited to the club for a Treffpunkt, a day of workshops, games, a German lunch and the opportunity to interact with others studying German. The Delta Phi Alpha, German Honor Society of the University of Delaware, program and reception organized by Dr. Iris Busch is held annually in May at the club. Elementary and intermediate German language classes taught by Helga Kissell and Alison Matsen are offered free of charge for adult members. The Deutsche Schule under the direction of Richard Grieb and Dr. Andreas Lehmann offers German language instruction on Sundays to member and non-member children ages 5-17. (non-members pay a minimum price.) All of these language oriented programs are administered by the Culture committee.

A yearly highlight is the Erntedankfest with church services alternating between Zion Lutheran

Church and Sacred Heart Oratory (former Sacred Heart Roman Catholic Church) followed by a harvest supper that is served by the Ladies at the club. In December the committee offers a reception with German cookies, coffee and punch after the Advent concert that is open to the public. Exhibits have been offered at the Stiftungsfest in March featuring various historical aspects of the club. Committee members, Hilde Cox and Trudy Gilgenast wrote the book, THE SAENGERBUND A 150 YEAR HISTORY OF THE GERMAN CLUB IN DELAWARE, for the 150 year celebration in 2003.

Speakers are invited to present material on our heritage and through the genealogy group to speak about their journey and what brought them to this country. Other programs include wine/beer tastings, musical programs, hosting of foreign guests with home stays, cultural tours to Germany, visits to the foreign embassies in Washington, D.C., sale of authentic German Christmas ornaments at the Christkindlmarkt in November, German vehicle displays at the picnic in June and occasional cooperative programs with the Sister Cities of Wilmington/Fulda.

The Culture committee is the backbone of all programs that encourage and celebrate our German heritage and customs. It is also the custodian of the club's archives, the repository of records, minutes and other historical materials.

In March the farmer harnesses his horses, he tends the fields and meadows. He plows, seeds and nurtures the earth and never sets still from morning till night.

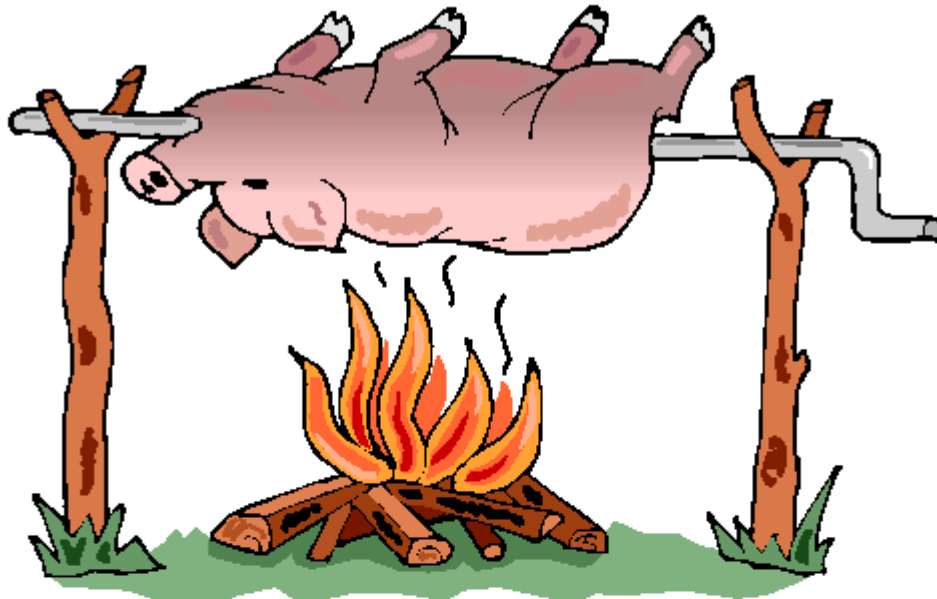
